21 222 223 224 225 226 227 228 229 330 331 332 333 333	Whereas, He received his MSc in 1952 from the University of the Republic (Montevideo, Uruguay) and his PhD from the University of Paris (France) in 1956, and his Sorbonne academic regalia was a colorful feature of every USC commencement. He was appointed as a Research Scientist to the CNRS in 1955, Associate Professor of Chemistry at the Universidad de Concepcion, Chile, 1956-1958, and held research appointments at McGill University (Canada) and Amherst College (1958-1959). He joined USC in 1959 on the University Park Campus in the Department of Chemistry and moved to the School of Pharmacy in 1962. His scholarship was recognized by promotion to Associate Professor in 1965, to Professor in 1970 and to Distinguished Professor in 1998. He served as Chairman of the Department of Biomedicinal Chemistry from 1968-1972, and as the Director of the Radiopharmacy Program, 1970-1990. Until his last illness, he was Chair of the Provost's Biomedical Imaging Science Initiative.

43 **Whereas** Professor Wolf demonstrated a profound commitment to the 44 development of new faculty leaders; 45 46 **Whereas** Professor Wolf maintained a fierce commitment to faculty 47 rights, as well as a love of open and meaningful discourse regarding 48 policies affecting the University; 49 50 **Whereas**, Professor Wolf demonstrated lifelong support for academic 51 freedom, a core value of this university and the Academic Senate, 52 manifested for example in his leadership role when USC considered 53 establishing a Middle East Center; 54 55 **Whereas**, Professor Wolf was active in the wider arena, exemplifying a 56 social conscience worthy of the highest standards of the academy, 57 58 exhibited for example in his defense of free interchange among scholars 59 internationally, and 60 **Whereas**.
