- More outreach from subject specialist librarians

- Space for collaborative student projects
- Computational tools, such as software to analyze social media data, and support for undergraduate research

- More outreach to staff
- Specifically more outreach to health sciences community
- Additional workshops on programs and services (e.g. literature search training for health sciences, data analytics)
- Better connectivity
- Specific resource requests, particularly legal and medical publications

- Open access support for USC faculty authors
- Shared, off-site storage for print collections
- Tutorials and support for research data organization and preservation
- Broader and deeper oral history collections
- Specific resource requests (e.g. journal titles, electronic databases to which we don't yet subscribe)

Q3: Share a useful program or service from a non-USC library.

- Open access, open educational resources (CSU Affordable Learning Solutions)
- Access to datasets for more efficient, large-scale mining of metadata and full-text
- Professional development resources
- More programming open to the public
- Collaborations with the Office of Sustainability
