| 25 | Call to Order: Margo Apostolos, Senate President |
| 26 | Academic Senate President Apostolos called the meeting to order at 2:05pm. |
| 27 | Discussion with President Carol Folt and Provost Andrew Guzman |
| 28 29 30 31 32 33 34 35 36 | President Carol Folt gave an overview of the current status of the university. She began by addressing an announcement about the CHIPS Act, passed by Congress in 2022, which provides federal investments in chip research in order to strengthen domestic semiconductor manufacturing, research and design. USC is one of the winners of a competition to receive monies from this Act. These funds will go towards a USC Hub and faculty from Viterbi, ISI, and ICT will be working with CalTech, UCLA, community colleges, and other UC's. She shared that this is a major effort in technological development and has major implications for the regional account economies. Big implication for regional economies, future workforce. \$190M over 5 years. |
| 37 | President Folt addressed Health Science 3.0 and that is moving forward. |

- 38 President Folt shared updates about Frontiers of Computing. We are close to \$600M toward a
- 39 \$1Billion initiative.
- 40 Jennifer Cohen was named USC Director of Athletics.
- 41 Metrics: Institution is still doing very well. Biggest admissions. Greatest number of applications
- 42 and successful offers. Leader in community college and transfer students. Research continues
- 43 to increase, almost at \$1.4Billion.
- 44 Capital Campus Many requests from faculty and others who are providing ideas about what
- can be done there. How do we best construct it, find the funding for it.

- LMS Introduce to the faculty in a way that is as smooth and painless as possible. Robust effort
- 48 to test in a way that is useful and identifying ways so that people have an opportunity to see
- 49 and use it. Ask the senate: Don't hesitate to learn it as it comes and encourage colleagues to

- 51 Supreme Court Decision on Affirmative Action: We've responded successfully. Gotten together
- 52 with the general council office to think through what that means. Engaged with admissions
- 53 office
- DC building 8 floors, many of which are not yet built out. Still a work in progress. Looking to
- find the most productive ways to engage the University. Wifi analogy. Ability to be non-
- 56 partisan.
- How can faculty, the Senate, and the students be involved and a part of the Capitol Campus?
- 58 Coming up with a set of rules of engagement.
- 59 Sustainability Hub, green medicine. It's not possible to come up with sustainability on a single
- page but the University has more influence at the start.
- Strategy for DEI recruitment and hiring. Our commitment to diversity has not been affected by
- 62 the decision. Fund for hiring dedicated to diversity that resides in the Provost office. Chris
- 63 Manning is working on inviting hiring committee members to workshops around hiring best
- 64 practices. Will generate web-based resources, training programs for committees in order to
- 65 increase success in hiring diverse faculty.
- 66 Updates on Faculty Handbook. Marty Levine shared that the Handbook chair is checking the
- last round of edits and web links will need to be fixed.
- 68 BTAA How and when can we be involved? President Folt will be attending the first meeting in
- 69 3 weeks. They are just starting to have these meetings. More information will be forthcoming.
- 70 What will be the clearinghouse for the Capitol Campus? It will be run through the Provost's
- office but you would reach out to the school dean. These mechanisms will be set up and
- solidified. Urban futures, Infrastructure and transportation? What are our urban strengths?
